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Course Description

Understanding and appreciation of music through explorations of its diverse styles, influences, and developments. Topics include musical elements, evolutions, and innovations, the role of the performer, non-western music, recording technologies, social commentary, music, and storytelling. Students will be examining their own musical preferences in depth. Students will be sharing and discussing their findings with classmates in a scholarly blog.

Course Goals

Students will write scholarly blog posts centered on self-selected material from a variety of musical topics. Throughout the course, students will recognize and describe fundamental music elements in their selections and analyze how these elements contribute to personal aesthetic judgments and emotional responses. By the end of the course, students will have created a blog that can be used as part of their educational portfolio for resumes and or graduate school applications.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will be guided to write scholarly, cited articles centered on a work of music. As they progress through the course the articles will present greater depth as students apply their knowledge of musical elements and aesthetic responses to a broader spectrum of musical concerns: styles, instruments, technology, entertainment, performances, marketing, and social commentary.

Technical Requirements

Regular access to the internet is required for this course. Students will need to be able to access Blackboard as well as have enough broadband width to stream YouTube videos. Assignments are published by students on an independent blogging platform, like WordPress. Students will be required to download and upload images and embed or link videos in their blogs. The use of an online editor, such as Grammarly is highly recommended. This course is not 100% compatible with tablets and mobile devices. You will need access to a laptop or desktop computer in order to take online assessments and properly format blog and comment submissions.

Instructional Methods

Instructional videos are part of each unit. The first unit contains online assessments in Blackboard. All subsequent units contain curated internet links to kickstart research. This research is used by students to write scholarly blog posts related to the unit topic. Specific criteria are required for each blog post, and students are assessed on how well they met that criteria. Students are also required to carefully read and respond to posts by fellow students. In addition to expressing their opinion, they need to further contribute to the discussion/learning.

Writing Like a Scholar

Due to the academic nature of the blogging assignments for this course, proper citation of quality sources, in MLA style with hyperlinks is required. Organization and careful editing are also expected. Inattention to typos, grammar, misspellings, and overall presentation will negatively impact grades. Submitted assignments that contain multiple writing errors and do not meet the standards of writing expected for a 200 level course, will be returned with a zero and the possibility of a rewrite. Late penalties will apply.

If you need help editing, organizing, citing research, and perfecting your work, the Writing Center is available to all students. Expectation of Student Effort

Students should expect to spend 9-12 hours per week on this class. Students are expected to complete all assignments by their due dates.

Late Assignment Policy

Assessments on Blackboard are accepted up to 3 days late without penalty. Blog posts are accepted up to 3 days late with a 5% point deduction for each day. Comments are accepted up to 3 days late with a 4 point per day deduction.

If circumstances arise that cause you to need more than 3 days extra on any assignment(s), e-mail your instructor for guidance. Extensions of due dates may be granted, but your instructor expects to be informed in advance if you are not able to submit your assignment on time. Emergency situations will be dealt with as needed.

Students are expected to maintain a working backup plan to be implemented in the event of a computer malfunction or an interruption of their normal Internet service during the course.

Course Deadlines

A complete schedule of course deadlines is linked on the left-hand side of the Blackboard site specific to this class. Deadlines can also be viewed in the My Grades section of Blackboard.

Working Ahead

Working ahead is encouraged for the assessments and blog posts. WARNING: You can get into trouble when you work ahead on the comment assignments. Avoid pitfalls that can earn you a zero and only do your comments 3 days in advance. Trust this cautionary guidance.

Zeros

It is possible to miss a few assignments, receive a few zeros, and still pass this course. However, too many missed assignments indicate a lack of student participation and the ability to pass the course. If you miss 4-5 missed assignments and have not contacted your instructor concerning permissible circumstances that would require flexibility, you will be withdrawn from the course by your instructor. This will happen before the last day to withdraw for the semester as given on the UAF academic calendar.

Mandatory Assignment

The first blogging assignment is mandatory. The criteria for this assignment must be met at 100% for students to continue with the course. Students will not be allowed to continue with subsequent assignments until this mandatory assignment is completed with all required components.

Proper Submission

All blog and comment assignments must be submitted properly, with the correct formatting. Formatting requirements are found in the first blogging and comment assignments and are linked in all subsequent blogging and comment assignments. If you do not submit your blogs and comments properly you will receive a zero. You will

be allowed to resubmit if there is a formatting error, but late penalties will be applied if they are resubmitted past the due date.

Redoing Assignments

- 1) All online assessments can be taken twice for an improved grade. **This does not apply to blog or comment assignments.**
- 2) The “Turn in Your First Blog” assignment can be resubmitted until all components are correct. Each resubmission takes 10 points off your grade.
- 3) If you receive a zero on a blog or comment assignment due to a small problem, you may be directed to redo or resubmit the assignment by your instructor.
- 4) These are the only situations where you can redo an assignment. All other blog posts and comments cannot be resubmitted for a better grade.

Grading Policy

There are 1249 total possible points for this course. Your grade will be based on the total number of points achieved. **HOWEVER** – Students who have achieved 1060 points or higher on all assignments prior to the final project won't be required to do the final project. Woo hoo! Make sure you submit comments on your classmates' final blog.

Scoring:

The minimum total points needed out of a course total of 1249

A = 1137

A- = 1112

B+ = 1093

B = 1024

B- = 999

C+ = 968

C = 899

C- = 874 - lowest total to have the course count towards graduation requirements

D = 749

F = 748 or below

That means that you could lose 89 points in the total course, and still have an A.

C- is the minimum acceptable grade required for all Core (X) Courses.

Finishing the Course

You are expected to finish all assignments and the final project by the dates listed on the course deadline. If you encounter rare, unexpected, and documented circumstances that prevent you from completing all the assignments and finishing by the course deadline, you should contact your instructor. You **MAY** qualify for a grade of **INCOMPLETE**, with a new deadline schedule to allow you time to complete the course.

Procrastination and poor planning are not legitimate considerations for an incomplete. Incompletes require extra work for your instructor and are not given freely.

How to Check Your Grade

To check your grades for assessments, blogs, and comment assignments and find comments from your instructor, click on the My Grades link in the sidebar menu. All assignments and any due dates are listed. Your instructor has left overall assessment comments, click on the speech bubble icon to view comments and feedback.

If the score is for an assessment, the title of the test is a link. Then click on the checkmark or your score to see results and feedback. Correct answers are shown to you after taking the assessment. The answers you scored incorrectly are not.

If the score is for a blog or comment assignment, the title of the assignment is a link and by clicking this link you'll be taken to your submission, grade, and comments.

If you see a green exclamation point, your assignment has not been graded yet.

Instructor Response Time

Most grading is done the day after a blog or comment assignment is due, on Mondays and Thursdays. Every effort is made to grade all assignments within 72 hours.

Academic Honesty

As described by UAF, scholastic dishonesty constitutes a violation of the university rules and regulations and is punishable according to the procedures outlined by UAF. Scholastic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating on an exam, plagiarism, and collusion. Cheating includes providing answers to or taking answers from another student.
